It reflects the dedication and hard work of our students, staff, and the broader school community.

St Mary's Forest School a big hit!

Embarking on a new educational journey, St. Mary's has introduced an exciting addition to its curriculum: Forest School! This term, Reception, Year 1, Year 4, and Year 6 classes delved into enriching lessons in Science, Geography, and History through immersive Forest School experiences, sparking fun and learning every step of the way.

Forest School represents a child-centred, inspirational learning process, offering holistic growth opportunities. Beyond enriching our curriculum, it fosters play, exploration, and nurtures supported risk-taking. This approach nurtures confidence and self-esteem by empowering learners through hands-on experiences in a natural setting. In Year 6, children enhanced their understanding of the 'living things and their habitats' Science unit. They explored the survival needs of diverse animals in their environments and expanded their knowledge of fair-trade foods while creating bread over a campfire.

"It teaches us life skills whilst also making us think about the curriculum." Year 6 child.

Meanwhile, Year 1 children dove into their Science topic by investigating the necessity of shelter and the elements essential for shelter construction. They crafted animal shelters using natural materials, gaining valuable insights into protection from the elements.

Year 4 children had a blast exploring the changing states of water—liquid, gas, and solid. Engaging in experiments, they observed and investigated state changes, delving into concepts like evaporation and condensation. This exploration extended to understanding the broader water cycle, connecting oceans, clouds, rain, and rivers.

Celebrating the wonder of dinosaurs, our Reception children dived into exploration, discovering the immense size of these creatures, their nesting behaviours, and the mysteries surrounding their extinction. At the end of their forest school adventure, the children enjoyed a delightful treat—toasting marshmallows, adding a sweet finale to their journey of discovery.

The Forest School experience has been a tremendous success, not just in expanding academic horizons but also in nurturing a deeper connection with nature and fostering a love for learning through hands-on exploration.

ST JOSEPH'S ACADEMY LEARN TO PROTECT OUR WONDERFUL WORLD

This term, one of the ways that St Joseph's Academy has been living out its mission statement is by focusing on being better stewards of God's creation and taking better care of its Common Home. They were inspired by a full day, immersive, interactive workshop delivered by Rise Theatre Company.

The day began with a performance; 2 skilled actors showed them how they are damaging the wonderful world which God has given to them and taught them more about the problems of pollution, global warming and litter to name but a few.

After the performance, each class participated in a Rise Theatre Workshop and an in class activity to reflect on their own role as stewards of God's creation.

During the workshop, children learned songs and signs and the very important message that each of us can help to save our planet. Year Five pupil Harry said, "Although we are all small as individuals, we can still make big changes if we all do our bit. We have to take responsibility".

The workshops culminated in an energetic, engaging – and loud – performance including all of the children and staff. They raised the roof as they sang, danced, signed and laughed and the chorus of "Who's Planet? God's Planet! Who's Planet? Our Planet!" rang around the school for days.

In the classroom, everyone completed an activity to be a Planet Hero. Some classes explored images and videos to reflect on God's beautiful creation and the reasons that He gifted it to humans. Inspired by some of David's psalms about the beauty of our world, children wrote their own psalms. Other classes listened again to the message of Pope Francis in Laudato Si before writing pledges of action to take more responsibility for our Common Home. Lisa said "Pope Francis said that the earth is God's gift to us. We need to take better care of it out of respect to God."

Pledges included planting more trees in the Prayer Garden to help to sustain and renew the planet. With the help of the Woodland Trust, the school has a new border of saplings around the edge of its Prayer Garden, making it an even calmer place to pray.

Many children pledged to only buy what they really need and to re-use items where possible. So far, they have done this by donating over 100 of their outgrown toys to Dougie Mac, bringing outgrown uniform back to school and putting it in their very own uniform bank. Many children have been given free uniform from the stock because they have outgrown theirs or joined the school as a new pupil.

Instead of buying new Advent Wreaths, they have reused last year's candles to make new wreaths with holly, conifers and greenery collected from the Forest School. The school is planning a January litter pick as its next project.

Around the Collegiate, students have been busy making music throughout this term.

First of all in our primary academies, we gave thanks for the harvest, celebrated with class singing assemblies and harvest masses, thinking of those in need and encouraging donations to support local food banks. Through October and November, children from four primary academies participated in Music Share projects, benefitting from specialist coaching from professional singers and joining with other schools to share music together at the spectacular Lichfield Cathedral. Students experienced a sung Evensong service, featuring music from the sixteenth century to the modern day in its original setting.

There was time to spend a moment thinking about the long history of the building from the 1100s to the modern day. Students viewed the recently returned relics of St Chad, which were safely protected by the Catholic community during the tumultuous history of the cathedral through the Civil War and, in more recent times, displayed at the home of our Catholic Archdiocese, St Chad's Cathedral in Birmingham. During the concert, the audience were treated to an eclectic collection of excellent and expressive song performances from the choir, interspersed with music from another tradition, British light operetta, performed with brilliance and comedic character by entertaining professionals.

Children from St Joseph's Academy participated in an online Sing and Create workshop with the Royal Opera House, London, and watched a livestream concert with BBC National Orchestra of Wales.

Many congratulations are due to St Joseph's and St Wilfrid's Academies who have both achieved Silver Artsmark Awards this term, rewarding the level of music education on offer at the schools and their interaction with the local community and regional music scene.

As the Christmas season approaches, academy choirs and talented musicians have been providing festive cheer in the communities they serve, singing at residential homes, performing for civic events and supporting fundraisers at the University Hospital. There have been a host of performances in schools for families and friends to attend, captivating Nativity productions along with traditional carol services. The Collegiate has also been represented by school groups in the City Songbirds Concerts at the Victoria Hall and older students have performed there with City Music Service Ensembles. St Margaret Ward Jazz Orchestra were asked to return to the King's Hall in Stoke to provide music for the Lord Mayor's Charity Afternoon Tea Party.

Behind the scenes, work is continuing in our academies to grow the range and number of instrumental lessons on offer in each primary academy and ensure a seamless transition to new teachers when entering high school at St Margaret Ward. Several primary school students have received invitations to participate in orchestra at St Margaret Ward and outstanding primary students performed solos at the 'Christmas Cracker' Concert at the high school.

There is much to look forward to next term with all academies participating in the Young Voices Concert and the Recorder Festival, not to forget other opportunities such as Stoke's Gotta Sing, the Manchester Camerata Song-writing project, Easter Bonnet parades and the traditional Lenten and Easter services.
