## Usually (There are always exceptions to the rule!)

If the root is not a word on it's own, you will add -ible or -ibly
horr + ible
1
not an identifiable
English root word
If the root is a word on it's own, you will usually add -able or -ably

The suffix -able is usually found in words which are adjectives. It means 'able to be'. This changes the meaning of the root words
as follows:
break
(verb) - to separate into pieces
e.g. I will break the vase
breakable
(adjective) - able to be separated into pieces e.g. The vase is very breakable.

## Friday

Many adjectives in the English language end in the same sound made with either -ant or -ent.


It is often tricky to decide which ending to use when you are spelling them...
e.g. is it observant or observent?

A good rule to follow is if the root word can be given an -ation ending then it will usually end in -ant.
