Homophones

Homophones are words that sound the same but have different meanings and usually different spellings. Check these out:

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Homophones are words that have the same sound but have different meanings and spellings like; blue and blew, great and grate.

A near homophone is a word which is pronounced almost the same as another word but has a different spelling and meaning. It is not the same as an actual homophone, which is a word that's pronounced the same as another word but has a different spelling and meaning; accept and except, precede and proceed.

Suffixes & Prefixes

Prefix - A prefix is added to the start of a root word to change the meaning; **dis** is a prefix - **dis** + appear = **disappear**

Suffix - A suffix is added to the end of a root word; **ment** is a suffix - appoint + **ment** = **appointment**

Root Word - A root word is a word we start with that does not have a suffix or prefix attached to it
