

Phenomenal Phonics! Activities for Nursery aged children

Sounds in the Environment



Go on a Listening walk!

- You could go around your house or garden and practice listening carefully to all the different sounds you hear.
- Did you recognise all the sounds? Were they loud or quiet, long or short?



Noise Makers!

 Gather a collection of your own noise makers and put them in a bag. You could include things like a crisp packet, set of keys, coins in a pot or a squeaky toy. Use one of the objects to make a sound for your child to guess.







'I hear with my Little Ear!'

• Play the game 'I hear with my little ear!' Take it in turns to imitate the sound of something found around your house, like a clock, telephone, or recognisable animal like a cat or dog. Can your child guess what makes that sound?







Sound Effect Stories!

• Read a familiar story or rhyme, use instruments or noise makers to add sound effects to the story.





- Developing children's speaking and listening skills.
- Developing phonological awareness.
- Developing children's oral blending and segmenting skill.

Voice Sounds



Guess the Animal???

 Play an animal themed guessing game. Make some sound effects for different animal noises and encourage your child to guess what animal sound you are making. You could 'meow' like a cat, 'woof' like a dog or 'hisss' like a snake.

Noisy Sentences

- Try reading and saying these NOISY sentences:
- The car went beep, beep!
- > The lion went ROAR!
- The cat went meow!
- Can your child think of a noisy sentence of their own?







Funny Voices

Play a funny voices game as you listen to a story. Can you speak like a troll? How about a fairy? What other characters could you be? Can you change your voice to make different voices for each character?



Letter Sounds

Mystery Bag

 Place 3 objects in a bag, like a 'ball', 'button', 'bear for the letter 'b'. Have your child name each item and guess the 'mystery letter' that all the objects start with.











Phonics Scavenger Hunt

• Can your chid find something in the house/garden starting with 's', 'a', 't' etc.

Letter sounds Race

- Pin up 2 3 sticky notes or pieces of paper around the room or garden with different letter sounds written on them.
- Say one of the letters and have your child run to the correct letter sound. Can they pronounce the letter sound correctly. Repeat several times.





Musical Letters

- Write several letters on pieces of paper and lay on the floor.
- Play some music, when the music stops, your child needs to stand on a letter sound. Can they tell you their letter to stay in the game?

Say 2 words

 When you say 2 words that begin with the same sound such as 'cat', 'cup' your child should stand up as fast as they can, but remain seated if the 2 words do not begin with the same sound.

Splat the letter!

- Use a flyswatter or plastic spatula to hit the letter you write on sticky notes.
- Say a letter for your child to splat!





Letter Sounds



Watering Letters – (TO BE COMPLETED OUTSIDE)

• Write some chalk letters outside on the floor. Call out a letter. Can you child water the correct one?


Letter Hopscotch

• Use chalk to create a letter hopscotch with your child. Can they hop on the 's', 'a', 't' etc.



Alphabet Ball

- First call out a letter and your child should respond with a word that begins with that letter.
- Then the adult throws or rolls the ball to the child.
- The child then calls out a letter for the adult to respond with a word that begins with that letter and so on.
- You can also play rhyming ball, where the thrower/roller provides a word for the catcher to rhyme with, e.g. cat, hat.



Oral Blending and Segmenting

These activities will help your child break down words and identify word families.

Spin and Rhyme

- Use a paper towel roll and clothes hanger to easily create rhyming words e.g. cat, pat, mat, sat.
- Cut your paper towel roll into sections.
- Write the ending sound of a word on one section e.g. 'an'.
- Now write the first letter of words that can be made on another piece of cut tube, e.g. 'p', 'f', 'c', 'm'.
- Pull out one end of the hanger from the bar and slide the tube pieces on and replace the end back inside the bar.
- Now your child can spin the first letter to make different words.







Oral Blending and Segmenting


Eddie the Explorer!

- Sound out and blend together the words below to find out what he needs to take;

- Play a listening and drawing game.
- Take it in turns with your child to sound out a simple CVC word to draw and then the other person has to draw the next item!
